Izzo Sentenced to 20-60 Years

Crowded courtroom bursts into applause

Calling his actions "incredibly depraved," Nassau County Court Judge Jack Mackston yesterday sentenced former school bus driver and Boy Scout leader Robert Izzo to 20 to 60 years in prison for the rape, sodomy and sexual abuse of four young boys and 16 kindergarten children.

Clad in a gray suit and standing with his hands cuffed behind him Izzo, 41, showed no emotion as Mackston announced the penalty for each of 73 counts.

When it was over, the audience burst into applause. The courtroom was packed with victims, their parents and relatives — and some of the boys who testified against Izzo.

"Bye, Bob," one parent called out as Izzo was led from the courtroom.

"Rot in hell, Mr. Bob," a father shouted. Officials say Izzo used to have the children on his bus call him "Mr. Bob."

On Feb. 27, Izzo, of Hicksville, was convicted on 35 counts of sodomy, sexual abuse and endangering the welfare of a minor for molesting three boys who were in a Boy Scout troop he served as an adult leader, and a fourth boy whose he family he had befriended. On April 2, Izzo pleaded guilty to 38 counts of rape, sodomy, sexual abuse and endangering the welfare of a child in the abuse of 16 kindergarten boys and girls who rode on his bus.

Yesterday's sentence was in accordance with the terms of an April 2 plea bargain agreement with the Nassau District Attorney's Office for the school bus case. Izzo agreed to plead guilty to sexually abusing the kindergarten children in exchange for a sentence of 20 to 60 years. He would actually serve no more than 50 years — the maximum term for rape. The maximum sentence allowed is 25 to 50 years, but the agreement called for 60 years to ensure that he would serve at least 20 years, since state guidelines say a prisoner must

serve at least a third of his maximum sentence.

Before imposing the sentence, Mackston asked Izzo to reaffirm the guilty plea, noting that in a pre-sentencing report that Izzo had denied that he was guilty. He complied, replying rapidly: "Yes, I reaffirm that plea."

"You have violated a sacred trust, the care and well-being of young children placed in your care," Mackston said. "You have caused untold suffering and mental anguish to the children and their families. You have taken their innocence and permanently scarred their minds. Your conduct, as far as I'm concerned, was incredibly depraved and you'll be sentenced accordingly."

Later, Nassau Assistant District Attorney Maureen Riordan praised the four boys who testified in the trial.

"I think the jury believed those four young boys," she said. "As a result,

they saved the sixteen kindergarten children from having to testify about the brutal things he did to them."

But Riordan acknowledged that some of four boys' parents were upset that their children had to endure the trauma of a trial.

Nonetheless, she said, "I ensured that their children would never have to testify [against Izzo] again in a criminal proceeding."

The sentence was the second-largest ever to be imposed in the county in a child sex abuse case. Richard Taus, a former FBI agent, was sentenced to 30½ to 92 years on Jan. 31.

"I'm very happy," said the father of a kindergarten victim. "I think my son's shirt says it all: 'You can't touch this.'"

The father of one of the Boy Scouts abused by Izzo said he was pleased with the sentence. "Twenty years gives him a lot of time to think about what he did wrong," said the man, whose son was 11 at the time of the abuse.

Izzo Guilty on All Sex Counts

Robert Izzo, the former Boy Scout leader and school bus driver charged with sexually abusing four boys, was found guilty last night of the 35 counts against him.

Izzo, 41, of Hicksville, faces a maximum sentence of 5½ to 167 years on the counts of first- and second-degree sodomy, first- and second-degree sexual abuse and endangering the welfare of three boys who were members of a Boy Scout troop he served as an adult leader and another youngster whose family he had befriended.

Sentencing is scheduled for April 2 before County Court Judge Jack Mackston in Mineola.

"I'm very relieved. I'm very happy.

It's over," said the mother of one of the victims. "My son can go on with his life. We all can."

"I'm happy," said one of the victims just before his mother swept him into her arms in an embrace.

Izzo's mother, Rose, burst into tears as the first of 35 "guilty" verdicts was read. His father, Fred, sat with his arm around his wife in the front row.

Parents of the victims — who were aged 10 to 12 when the incidents occurred — also began to weep as the verdict was read, as did the parents of children involved in a separate, 143-count indictment in which Izzo is charged

with sexually abusing 16 kindergarteners who rode on his school bus.

Izzo showed little reaction to the verdict but appeared somewhat red-eyed as he was led away.

Members of the jury, which returned the verdict at 6:50 p.m. after deliberating less than 6½ hours, said there was little disagreement in the jury room.

"We believed the kids," juror Douglas Kraus said.

"What really got us the most is that they [the boys] had nothing to gain by going up on that stand," said Frank Ferraro, another juror. "There were certain things the children said that they just couldn't have made up. It's impossible."

Earlier yesterday, the prosecution and the defense used their summary arguments to attack the credibility and motives of each other's witnesses and to accuse them of lying. Defense lawyer Anthony Capetola, pounding the lectern and shouting at the jurors, charged that the stories of the four boys were tailored by police and that his client was left to try to defend himself against charges stemming from incidents that supposedly occurred one to three years before his arrest.

"The power of suggestion with young, impressionable children is a powerful factor for you to consider here," he said.

He also asked jurors to consider the "likelihood" that — as two of the boys alleged — Izzo would molest a child in his own house with Izzo's parents, sons and wife at home.

His client, he said, was placed in an impossible position: Arrested in May, 1989, and charged with incidents that occurred as far back as 1986, "he's called upon . . . by this indictment to pinpoint his whereabouts" at those times.

Nassau Assistant District Attorney Maureen Riordan insisted that it was Izzo who was lying.

"Robert Izzo is the only person who stands to gain by coming in here and telling less than the truth," she said, adding: "What possible motives do these boys have to come in" and tell you lies?

Riordan spent 40 minutes reviewing the incidents and corroborating testimony that was given by the parents of the boys and by Izzo. "The testimony of the defendant is important for one reason," she said. "Because it corroborates every date that the children say they were with this man."

Riordan noted that while the boys may have appeared confused about the dates on which the sexual abuse occurred, they described the incidents and the places where they occurred in great detail. Those details, and the fact that the boys had never otherwise been at those locations, made it unlikely that they were coached in their answers by police, she said.

As for the boys' initial silence about the incidents, she said: "Maybe they didn't go to their parents and tell them in words, but they certainly showed them in action." Riordan was referring to testimony from parents that the boys were upset and didn't want to attend Scout meetings.

DA Proceeding With Second Izzo Sex Case

In an effort to ensure maximum prison time for convicted child sex abuser Robert Izzo, the Nassau District Attorney's office said yesterday it will proceed with the prosecution of a second indictment charging the former school bus driver with abusing 16 kindergartners who rode his route.

"We're ready for trial," said Edward Grilli, a spokesman for District Attorney Denis Dillon. He said Dillon had no plans to drop the charges in the second indictment, which contains 143 counts of sexual abuse against Izzo, who already faces 167 years in prison following his conviction Wednesday.

In that trial, a jury convicted Izzo, 41, on 35 counts of sodomy, sexual abuse and endangering the welfare of a child for molesting three boys who were members of Izzo's Boy Scout troop, and a fourth boy whose family he befriended. The jury deliberated for six hours.

that Izzo's transgressions went far beyond the abuse of four boys.

Izzo, a former Boy Scout leader, faces 55½ to 167 years in prison if he is sentenced consecutively on each count. But the maximum time he can serve under state law is 25 to 50 years. Grilli said the district attorney would pursue the new case in order to ensure that Izzo serves the maximum jail time allowable. He said that additional convictions would also make the state parole board aware

About 20 kindergartners' parents who were outside the courthouse after Wednesday's verdict said they were prepared for the ordeal of a second trial, even though it could mean putting their children on the stand.

"Those boys [the youths that testified] proved that Bob Izzo was a child abuser," said one father, who had cried and cheered when the verdict was announced. "The jury believed it, and now New York State believes it. We're ready to go."

A trial date on the second indictment is expected to be set on April 2, the day Izzo is scheduled for sentencing before County Court Judge Jack Mackston in Mineola.

Izzo's lawyer, Anthony Capetola, yesterday declined to comment on the guilty verdict. But he said that his firm would represent Izzo in the second case if it goes forward.

Asked if Izzo would plead guilty to the second indictment in exchange for a lesser sentence, Capetola said he didn't know, but that if the district attorney's office offered a plea bargain it's expected to require Izzo to waive his right to appeal the first conviction. "So we have to consider the options," he said.

Charles Brennan, a lawyer who represents the kindergarten pupils' parents in approximately 40 civil suits seeking more than \$100 million against the Hicksville school district and Harran Transport School Bus Company, said yesterday that the recent conviction would not affect the civil suits because it did not involve the kindergarten children. But he said it could have a "very strong practical effect" on settlement negotiations.

Ex-Wife Backs Izzo at Trial

In a surprise move by the defense, the ex-wife of Robert Izzo took the stand at his trial yesterday and supported his denial that he sexually abused a former Boy Scout who slept over.

Michelle Muyse, who remarried last year after divorcing Izzo, said that Izzo, 41, of Hicksville, who was the youngster's scoutmaster, brought him home on Oct. 19, 1988, after an overnight camping trip was canceled. The boy slept on a living room sofa and Izzo slept with her in an upstairs bedroom, she said.

Muyse was the final defense witness. Her account followed that of Izzo's mother, Rose, who smiled warmly at the defendant and was quickly dismissed from the stand after admitting she had been in the courtroom for earlier testimony, and Izzo's cross-examination. Final arguments are expected today.

The boy, now 13, has testified that he was sodomized by Izzo during the night while other family members were asleep. During cross-examination by Assistant District Attorney Maureen Riordan, Muyse conceded that she left Izzo shortly after his arrest and said that it was for the "protection" of their two sons.

Muyse did not look at Izzo during her testimony before Nassau County Court Judge Jack Mackston in Mineola, where Izzo's trial is in its third week.

Izzo is being tried in connection with a 35-count indictment alleging that he sexually abused three boys who were members of his Boy Scout troop and a fourth youngster whose family he befriended. He also has been charged in a second, 143-count indictment with sexually abusing 16 kindergarten children who rode on his school bus.

Once again, the courtroom was packed with parents of the kindergarten youngsters involved in the pending case, who leaned forward in their seats to hear Izzo's testimony on cross-examination.

The parents of the four boys involved in the present case have been barred from the courtroom at the request of defense lawyer Anthony Capetola, who said he might call the parents for further questioning. Before the proceedings yesterday, two of the boys' mothers were spotted in the audience and were asked to leave.

Izzo was cross-examined for an hour yesterday by Riordan, who showed him photographs of the school bus yard and other sites of the alleged molestations and established Izzo's presence at the times of the alleged abuse.

Grueling Testimony

Boy in sex-abuse case grilled on statements

A 14-year-old boy faced an exhausting 3½ hour cross-examination yesterday over statements he made to police and a Nassau County grand jury about Robert Izzo, who is standing trial on charges of sexually abusing young boys.

The youth, questioned by Nassau Assistant District Attorney Maureen Riordan, first testified that he was sodomized by Izzo in six incidents between 1986 and 1988. The incidents allegedly occurred in the Westbury camera shop where Izzo was employed in 1986, in Izzo's car outside a school bus garage in Hicksville, on a school bus Izzo formerly drove, and in the laundry room of the boy's home, among other places.

The boy, described by prosecutors as having a learning disability and coming from a troubled family, often admitted he was confused or didn't understand the questions as Izzo's attorney, Anthony Capetola, cross-examined him aggressively on the alleged incidents. Repeatedly, County Court Judge Jack Mackston asked Capetola to simplify the questions or rephrase them for the boy.

At one point, Capetola objected to Mackston's rephrasing of a question. Mackston replied, "We're dealing with a child here," and Capetola shot back, "I object to your comments in front of the jury" and called for the panel's withdrawal. Mackston rejected the request.

Izzo, 41, of 12 Loretta Lane, Hicksville, is be-

ing tried in Mineola on a 35-count indictment in connection with molesting three boys who were members of a Boy Scout troop he served as an adult leader and a fourth youngster — yesterday's witness — whose family he had befriended. He also has been charged in a second, 143-count indictment in connection with the sexual abuse of 16 kindergarten children who rode on his school bus.

During the cross-examination, Capetola hammered away at the boy's testimony, repeatedly going over the dates and locations of the alleged incidents in an effort to show that his testimony was directed by the prosecutor.

The boy appeared to become increasingly confused and tired as Capetola questioned him about the incidents repeatedly, blurting out at points, "I don't know," and "I don't remember." He also admitted being unable to read a statement he gave to detectives because he couldn't read the detective's handwriting.

The boy testified that Riordan "told me she was going to direct me to a certain month" and where the incident took place, ". . . so I'd have an idea. So I wouldn't get confused about the months."

Outside the courtroom, Capetola said, "He's been told he's going to testify about six things, and if you take those six things out of order or don't give him some key words that the prosecution has given him, then he doesn't remember the incident at all." The trial continues today.

Boy Describes Sex Abuse

A 13-year-old boy testified yesterday that embarrassment prompted him to lie to police the first time he was asked about Robert Izzo, a former Boy Scout leader and school bus driver who is standing trial on charges of sexually abusing young boys.

"I didn't tell them everything," the boy said of the first questioning by police.

The testimony came during more than an hour of gentle, but persistent cross-examination by defense lawyer Anthony Capetola, who picked away at discrepancies in statements the boy gave to police. Capetola repeatedly quizzed the youngster about when the alleged abuse occurred and about an account the boy first gave to detectives in which he denied being touched by Izzo.

"You lied to the detective at that point in time?" Capetola asked. "Yeah," the boy said.

The youngster also admitted that he continued to go to Scout meetings after the assault in October, 1988, and returned to Izzo's house about two months later to play with Izzo's sons. But Capetola was unable to shake the boy's testimony that the abuse did occur, although several times the youth said he didn't understand the questions.

Later, under questioning by Nassau Assistant District Attorney Maureen Riordan, the boy said that at first he didn't tell police because he was "embarrassed" and "afraid." The youngster, now in the seventh grade, was the prosecution's first witness in the case against Izzo before County Court Judge Jack Mackston in Mineola.

Izzo is being tried on a 35-count indictment charging him with sexually abusing four boys between 1986 and 1988. Three were members of a Hicksville Boy Scout troop Izzo served as an adult leader, and the fourth was a boy whose family Izzo

befriended. Izzo is to be tried on a second, 143-count indictment charging him with abusing 16 kindergartners who rode on his school bus in 1989.

The boy testified Izzo took him to the Izzo home in Hicksville after an overnight scouting trip at the Sands Point preserve was canceled because of rain. He testified he was sexually abused by Izzo shortly after he got into a sleeping bag on Izzo's sofa. Gesturing with his hand, at Riordan's request, he

attempted to show the jury what had occurred. Once, again at Riordan's request, he looked directly at Izzo and pointed at him as the man who committed the abuse. Izzo, sitting forward in his seat at the defense table, looked in the boy's direction, but did not react.

The boy, who also testified he punched Izzo in the face after the incident, was the first of the victims scheduled to testify against Izzo. Also yesterday, the boy's mother said she called police back to the house because "I felt my child was hiding something."

13-Year-Old Testifying in Izzo Trial Is Grilled

An eighth-grade boy was questioned for more than two hours yesterday about inconsistencies in statements he made to police and a Nassau County grand jury about Robert Izzo, who is standing trial on charges of sexually abusing young boys.

The boy, now 13, testified on direct examination by Nassau Assistant District Attorney Maureen Riordan that he was molested by Izzo in three incidents in 1987 and 1988.

He said the first incident took place in October, 1987, when he slept in a bedroom in Izzo's Hicksville home with Izzo's two sons. He said the second occurred in

May, 1988, when Izzo took him for a ride on a school bus, and the third in October, 1988, at an overnight Boy Scout trip to the Muttontown Preserve.

Izzo, 41, of 12 Loretta Lane, is being tried on a 35-count indictment in connection with molesting three boys who were members of a Boy Scout troop he served as an adult leader and a fourth youngster whose family he had befriended. He also has been charged in a second, 143-count indictment in connection with the sexual abuse of 16 kindergarten children who rode on his school bus.

Defense lawyer Anthony Capetola, in an aggressive cross-examination that was interrupted several times by judicial objections at the boy's and Izzo's

noted that the October, 1987, incident was omitted from two statements the boy made to police, and first came to light in testimony the boy gave to a grand jury.

And Capetola said that according to one statement the boy made to police, the October, 1988, incident in a camp tent also involved a 15-year-old youth, who was not mentioned yesterday during testimony in answer to the prosecutor's questions. Testimony about the 15-year-old, who the witness said held him down while he was sexually abused by Izzo, was brought out on cross-examination.

Capetola also noted that police recorded the October, 1988, incident as having happened in November, 1988. He repeatedly pressed the boy to explain the inconsistencies between the statements he gave police and his testimony in court. The boy, who gave clear answers, was composed through most of the questioning, but as it continued after lunch, he appeared tired and on the verge of tears. "I did the detective insert things that you didn't tell them in the statements . . . ?" Capetola asked.

"They could have misunderstood what I said," the boy said. After more questioning, he said he told a detective what happened and the officer wrote it down. Speaking slowly and deliberately, the boy said: "I didn't read it word for word, I skinned it." Riordan declined to comment about the 15-year-old and why he was not charged. But Assistant District Attorney Barry Grennan, chief of the major offense bureau, said the teen was a minor and had not committed a criminal act.

Sobs From Boy's Mom at Izzo Trial

The mother of a boy who said he was sexually abused during an overnight Boy Scout trip in Oyster Bay by Robert Izzo — a former adult Scout leader charged with abusing four boys — sobbed openly as she testified about her son's behavior in the aftermath of the incident.

"He would be violent at times, not by hitting anything, but by banging on things," the woman said. Her son, who is now 12, also became obsessed with collecting knives, she said, "because he thought he had to protect himself."

The woman, who broke down during questioning by the prosecutor, Nassau Assistant District Attorney Maureen Riordan, declined a recess offered by County Court Judge Jack Mackston.

Fighting for composure as she sipped water from a paper cup, the woman said the family tried to reassure her son that they loved him no matter what had happened to him. "That's why this is so painful," she said.

Izzo, seated at the defense table a few feet away, leaned forward to listen to the testimony but did not react to the tears. His lawyer, Anthony Capetola, declined to cross examine the woman. She was one of six witnesses who testified yesterday morning at County Court in Mineola. The woman was preceded by her son, who testified that he was sexually abused by Izzo in October, 1988, during an overnight Scout trip at the Muttontown Preserve in Oyster Bay. The boy was 10 years old at

the time of the incident.

Izzo, of 12 Loretta Lane, Hicksville, who formerly was a school bus driver and an adult leader for a Boy Scout troop, is being tried on a 35-count indictment charging him with the sodomy and sexual abuse of four boys aged 10 to 12 in incidents that occurred between 1986 and 1988.

He also has been charged in a second, 143-count indictment in connection with the sexual abuse of 16 kindergarten children who rode on the school bus he drove,

In other testimony yesterday, a 12-year-old former scout said he was awakened by the screams of another boy, now 13. Last week, the 13-year-old testified that on the second night of the Muttontown Preserve camping trip he was sexually abused by Izzo while a then-15-year-old youth held him down. Prosecutors said the 15-year-old wasn't charged because he had not committed a crime.

During cross examination by Capetola, the 12-year-old, who was not abused, said he had been questioned by police about 20 times during a two-month period for about two hours at a time and that two other boys — who police say were abused by Izzo — told him they were similarly questioned. His testimony contradicted the court statements of the two other boys who have testified that they spoke to police only two or three times.

"That was part of the conditioning the detectives engaged in to tailor the testimony of each of these witnesses," Capetola said after the court had recessed for the day.

The trial continues today.

In Abuse Case, Kids Face Trial, Too

The thinly built 13-year-old had not wanted to testify about the sexual abuse he said was inflicted by the diminutive man with heavy-lidded eyes staring at him from the defense table of the Mineola courtroom. Despite his reluctance, the pale young boy, his black pants gathered and cinched around his waist, braved the stares of the defendant, Robert Izzo, his former Boy Scout troop leader, and about 40 officials and courtroom spectators last week and told of three incidents of abuse between October, 1987, and October, 1988.

"Think how difficult it would be to talk (in court) about normal sexual activity as an adult," Assistant District Attorney Maureen Riordan said. "Your heart just goes out to them."

But when inconsistencies surfaced in the account of sexual abuse from the boy and other young witnesses during persistent cross examination by defense attorney Anthony Capetola, it highlighted problems inherent in building a prosecution, or a defense, when crucial testimony is provided by children.

Asked to identify the culprit, the boy pointed unwaveringly across the courtroom at Izzo. But he'd made no mention of one of the three incidents of abuse in previous statements to police. And in his direct testimony the boy said nothing about a 15-year-old who he'd told police once held him down while Izzo molested him.

The youngster said police may have "misunderstood" what he told them and the mistakes slipped through because he only "skimmed" the statement they wrote before affixing his signature.

Another boy, 13, testified at trial that he was abused after initially telling police Izzo never touched

Testifying can be therapeutic if it helps a child move from seeing himself as a helpless victim to seeing himself as the one who made the accused answer for his crimes, experts say. That's how the thin boy was convinced to testify.

"I just told him he had to do the right thing, otherwise this guy wouldn't get put away," said the boy's father, while peeking into the ornate courtroom through a small window in the door.

The downside is if a child's memories of abuse are called into question, the child can feel they've failed as a witness, particularly if the accused is not convicted, Pelcovitz said. That can add to a victim's feelings of guilt and counter the positive effects of the decision to testify, he said.

Izzo also has been charged in a 143-count indictment with sexually abusing 16 kindergarten children who rode his school bus in 1988 and 1989. That case is pending. But a conviction in the case currently on trial could prompt a plea, saving the younger children the ordeal of testifying.

If a trial is necessary in the pending case, Riordan said, she plans to have the 16 children testify in open court.

"The bottom line is it (the case) still hinges on their testimony," Riordan said. "Whether they're four or fourteen, we're asking them to be an adult" and talk openly about what happened.

Decisions involving child witnesses begin long before trial, Riordan said. Is the child emotionally strong enough to confront the defendant and withstand cross examination? Will parents cooperate? Should the child testify in person or via television? And does it help or hurt a child's recovery from the trauma of sex abuse if he participates in a criminal prosecution?

Experts say parents sometimes simply refuse to be-

lieve their child has been molested. Less skeptical parents are counseled to think a couple of days about their child testifying before a grand jury and at trial before committing them to a prosecution, Riordan said. While she wouldn't say if any parents refused to let their children participate in the case against Izzo, Riordan acknowledged that some, though not many, do back out of cases when faced with the prospect of testifying in open court.

There are options, but none of them preferable, she said. Testimony for the grand jury can be videotaped. And children 12 years old or younger can have a mental health professional with them when testifying before a grand jury.

At trial, both the U.S. Supreme Court and the New York Court of Appeals have allowed child victims to testify via closed circuit television, but only if prosecutors establish in a pre-trial hearing that a child is a vulnerable witness who can be intimidated or harmed psychologically by testifying in open court.

Riordan sought no such special treatment for young witnesses against Izzo. Live testimony at trial denies the defense a possible issue for appeal, she said. And the grand jury is a good dress rehearsal.

Capetola said he would have opposed an application for testimony via closed circuit television. "When you look at it (testimony) on a monitor, it becomes very sterile," he said.

As the young boy — the second of Izzo's four alleged victims in this case — testified last week, his parents and supporters waited outside the courtroom. It was the boy's request, they said.

"He knows we know what happened but he doesn't want us to hear it," said the boy's father, rubbing his already pink eyes. "It's stuff he didn't want people to know."

Capetola maintained that the discrepancies were signs that the boys may have been coached. Strengthen the case against Izzo, 41, a former school bus driver on trial in Mineola on 35 counts of sexual abuse involving young boys. The difficulty for the defense, Capetola said, is striking a balance between making a witness' story and bullying a child. It can be a no-win situation if you discredit a witness' testimony but in asking so alienate jurors. "You have to be very careful and try to do it very delicately and not appear to be bludgeoning a child witness. You've got to take the time to be more surgical," Capetola said.

Riordan, who avoided speaking specifically about the Izzo case, said it's not unusual for children to be bazy on details. But "children never forget the sexual abuse," Riordan said.

Children of the ages involved in this case can be very reliable and accurate witnesses, said David Pelcovitz, chief psychologist at North Shore University Hospital's division of child and adolescent psychiatry. "It's almost typical as the disclosure comes out, it comes out a little at a time," he said.

Izzo Testifies, Denies Charges of Sex Abuse

Taking the stand in his own defense, Robert Izzo, the former Boy Scout leader and school bus driver accused of sexually abusing four young boys, faced a courtroom packed with parents and categorically denied all the charges against him.

"Did you commit any of the acts that these boys accuse you of?" his lawyer, Anthony Capetola asked.

"No, I did not," Izzo, 41, said in a calm, clear voice.

The testimony from the sad-faced man dressed in a navy blue suit and striped tie was heard in a quiet courtroom, as prosecutors had warned parents of the boys involved against any outbursts. Cross-examination is set for Monday.

Izzo, of Hicksville, is accused of molesting three boys who were members of his Boy Scout troop and a fourth youngster, now 14, whose family he befriended, in several incidents between 1986 and 1988 that allegedly occurred at places including his home, a school bus, a car, and on overnight camping trips.

Yesterday, in 20 minutes of questioning, he disputed the testimony of the four boys, challenging the times and the dates of the alleged incidents. He also denied being alone with the youngsters or having physical contact with any of them.

Of the camping trips, Izzo denied that he shared a tent with two boys who testi-

fied they were sexually abused by Izzo on separate nights during a trip to the Mutontown Preserve in East Norwich.

Asked what contact he had with the boys, he responded, "visual and verbal" at a campfire or during activities. Questioned in connection with the 14-year-old, Izzo denied ever being alone with the boy. Asked why he had been in the boy's home on Christmas Day, 1986, Izzo said he was there to bring gifts for the family.

"Did you see him at any other point?" Capetola asked.

"No, I did not."

"Drive him anywhere?"

"No, I did not."

Izzo, who is standing trial on a 35-count indictment, also is charged in a separate 143-count indictment with sexually abusing 16 kindergarten children who rode on his school bus. The courtroom was crowded with parents of kindergartners involved in the second indictment who were alerted during the lunch break that Izzo would take the stand. A few attend daily.

"One of the things I do like about his taking the stand is that he's going to look out here and see that we're all still here," a mother of a purported kindergarten victim said. A father chimed in, "Yup, we haven't gone away."

Asked later about Izzo's denials, Capetola said, "Mr. Izzo wanted to testify to let the jury know what occurred and he did."

Izzo Child Abuse Case Begins In Mineola

A 13-year-old Hicksville boy was the first to take the witness stand as the trial of Robert Izzo began in Nassau County Court last week.

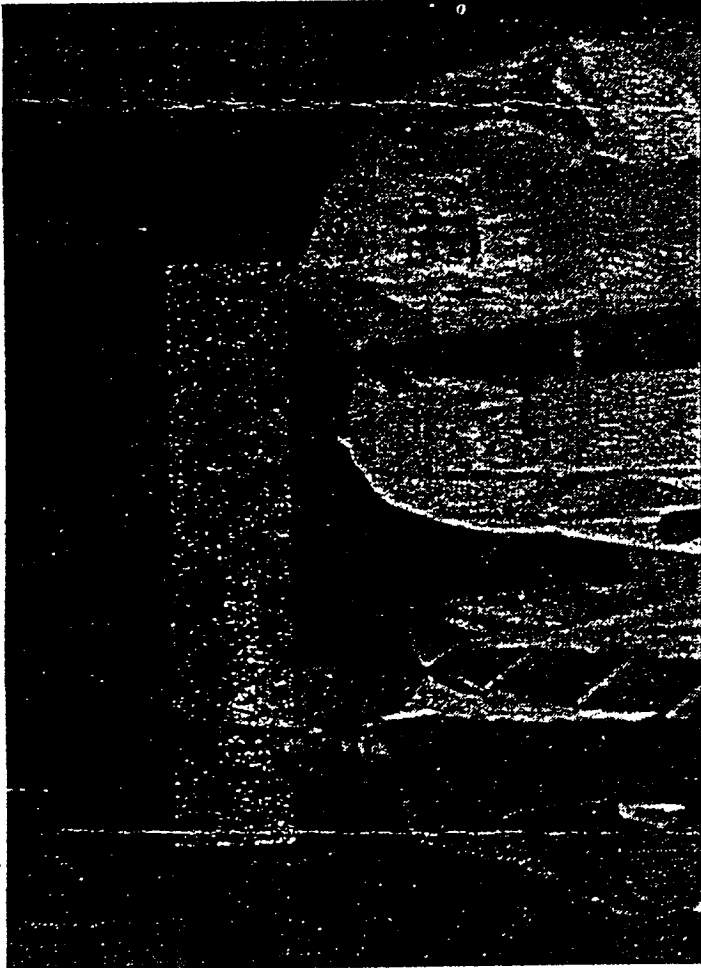
Izzo, the 41-year-old Hicksville school bus driver and boy scout troop leader, has been charged with molesting children he was taking to and from school, as well as boys in his scout troop.

The first witness testified before a jury of nine men and five women—including two alternates—in the Mineola courtroom of Judge Jack Mackston that he was molested by Izzo after a Boy Scout camping trip in 1988.

Izzo is being tried on two indictments charging that he sexually abused three Boy Scouts and another boy. A separate, 143-count indictment charges him with molesting 16 kindergarten children who were passengers in buses he drove between 1986 and 1988, according to Nassau County Assistant District Attorney Maureen Rioridan, who is prosecuting Izzo.

A spokesperson for D.A. Denis Dillon was unable to give a time frame of how long the trial would last.

During the testimony, the 13-year-old boy, who was 11 at the time of the incident, said that a camping trip to Sands Point was rained out, and that Izzo, instead of taking him home, drove him to Izzo's residence.

In a flat voice—the youth usually confined his answers to “yeah” or “no”—the boy described how Izzo molested him in the living room of the house. The boy's request for

Izzo to “stop,” was answered with a terse “shut up,” the witness testified.

After the incident, the youngster said he punched Izzo in the face.

During cross-examination by Mineola defense attorney Anthony Capetola, the witness testified that he did not tell police of the incident when a detective first came to his home in 1988, but did tell the whole story in a second interview that took place in August of 1989.

When Capetola asked the boy why he waited almost 10 months before reporting the incident, the witness answered that he was “embarrassed.” Capetola asked the boy if he continued to attend scout meetings after the alleged incident, and the youth said yes, but that he “cut” some meetings until his 21-year-old sister noticed that he was not attending them.

Throughout the morning's proceedings, Capetola questioned the witness on minute details, focusing on discrepancies in the two statements the boy gave detectives. On several occasions, the boy said he didn't understand Capetola's questions.

Also testifying on Feb. 13 were the boy's mother and a man who was also on the camping trip.

On Feb. 14, another boy testified that he was molested in three separate incidents by Izzo.

Judge Mackston told the jurors that the case would continue on Feb. 19. No testimony was to be taken Feb. 15, due to other court business, and the courts were closed Feb. 18 for the Presidents' Day holiday.



Jurors Screened In Sex Abuse Case

A preliminary screening of 500 prospective jurors began yesterday in the case of Robert Izzo, a former school bus driver and scout leader scheduled to stand trial for the alleged sexual abuse of 20 young children.

By day's end, 303 of the 400 people summoned to the courtroom asked to be excused from duty after learning the nature of the case, the name of the defendant and the expected length of the trial — three weeks.

"This is the largest number of jurors sent to a particular case since [Robert] Golub [who was convicted in April of murdering 13-year-old Kelly Tinnes]," Nassau Commissioner of Jurors Thomas DeVivo said yesterday. County Court Judge Jack Mackston is attempting to assemble a pool of about 110 people from which to select 12 jurors and two to four alternates, DeVivo said.

Screening continues today.

In an interview after the proceeding, Izzo's lawyer, Anthony Capetola, said he did not believe Izzo could get a fair trial in Nassau because of the publicity surrounding the case. "We'll see how it goes and possibly file for a change of venue," he said.

Izzo, wearing a navy suit and tie, showed up in court unshaven and with long hair, prompting Capetola to complain to the judge. Mackston denied a motion to excuse Izzo, saying he could clean up at the lunch break. "Apparently, the jail didn't allow him access to a razor," Capetola said later. "And this is the most important appearance of his life."

Izzo of 12 Loretta Lane, Hicksville, was first arrested in May, 1989, and charged with sexually abusing a 12-year-old boy in 1986 when the youngster was 10. Izzo was released on \$20,000 bail in that case, but was re-arrested two months later in connection with the alleged sexual abuse of a 5-year-old girl.

In July, a grand jury handed up a 20-count indictment in connection with the 12-year-old boy, and in September, Izzo was indicted a second time on 15 counts of abuse dealing with three boys who were members of his scout troop. A third indictment was handed up in October, 1990, in connection with the alleged sexual abuse of 16 kindergarten children.

Izzo, who is being held on \$750,000 bail, will be tried in connection with the first two indictments dealing with the four boys.

Molestation Trial Begins in Mineola

The actions of a former school bus driver and Boy Scout leader charged with molesting four young boys were portrayed by the prosecutor yesterday as a breach of trust on the part of an adult, while the defense attorney dismissed the allegations as the exaggerated claims of children with active imaginations.

In a 45-minute opening statement, Nassau Assistant District Attorney Maureen Riordan gave the sordid details of a 35-count indictment against Robert Izzo, 41, of 12 Loretta Lane, Hicksville. She said Izzo used his position as a school bus driver and Boy Scout leader to gain access to children who became victims of his sexual advances.

"This is a case about a breach of trust," Riordan said.

Izzo has been charged with sexually abusing 16 kindergarten children who rode on the school bus he drove, three boys who were members of a scout troop for which he served as an adult leader, and a boy whose family Izzo befriended.

He is being tried first before County Court Judge Jack Mackston in Mineola on a 35-count indictment dealing with the four boys. A second indictment, involving the kindergarten boys and girls, charges him with 143 counts including rape, sodomy, sexual abuse and endangering the welfare of a child.

In a brief statement to the jury, Izzo's

lawyer, Anthony Capetola of Mineola, attempted to discredit the charges, saying the incidents involved "simple, innocent, non-sexual circumstances."

He said the prosecution would fail to prove its case. Asked during a recess whether the boys were lying, Capetola said: "I think they're expanding upon their imaginations."

During the prosecutor's opening statement, Izzo periodically took notes on a yellow legal pad. His parents sat behind him in a front row of the courtroom. The parents and friends of victims sat on the opposite side of the room.

Using explicit language that caused some jurors to shift uneasily in their seats, Riordan described how Izzo allegedly assaulted the four boys, then aged 10 to 12, in 10 different incidents between 1986 and 1988.

According to Riordan, the assaults occurred at Izzo's home, on the school bus and on overnight camping trips. In one incident, Riordan said, Izzo took a Scout to his house after rain canceled an overnight trip. She said the boy's parents would testify that they were not notified of the cancellation or that the boy would spend the night at Izzo's house.

"The proof will show that the child fought and that the child told him to stop and that the child was told to shut up, that it would only take a few seconds," she said.

The trial is to continue tomorrow with the testimony of the victims.

Man Admits He Drove Bus During Assault on Child

In what is expected to be key evidence in the prosecution of Robert Izzo, a former school bus driver yesterday admitted he drove while Izzo sodomized a kindergarten boy on the school bus.

Anders L. Quintano, 32, of East Williston made the admission in Nassau County court in response to questions from Assistant District Attorney Maureen Riordan, who is prosecuting the Izzo case. Izzo has been charged with 178 counts of rape, sodomy, sexual abuse and endangering the welfare of a child.

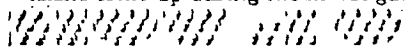
Quintano pleaded guilty to criminal facilitation for driving the bus while Izzo sodomized the boy. He also pleaded guilty to first-degree sex abuse in an unrelated case in which he admitted fondling a 10-year-old girl, the daughter of a family friend, in March, 1987.

County Court Judge Marvin Goodman scheduled sentencing for Dec. 6 and promised Quintano that he would not receive more than 2 1/2 to 7 years, the maximum penalty for first-degree sex abuse.

Quintano's lawyer, Eugene Cordaro, said in an interview yesterday that his client pleaded guilty to the top count because he "wanted to get it over with."

Izzo is being held on \$750,000 bail in connection with the alleged sexual abuse of 21 children, including 16 kindergartners. Quintano's name came up during the investigation of Izzo.



School bus driver cited 143 times

In what may be the largest sex abuse case ever prosecuted on Long Island, a former Hicksville school bus driver and scout leader is charged in a new 143-count indictment that for the first time adds rape to the list of allegations against him.

The new indictment against Robert Izzo, the third to be handed up by a Nassau grand jury this year, charges that the 39-year-old father of two sexually abused 16 kindergarten children who were on his school bus last year. It raises the number of charges against Izzo to 178 and the number of alleged victims to 20.

Officials in Nassau and Suffolk said they knew of no larger case.

"This is the largest number of sex abuse charges for an individual in Nassau County and the case is expected to involve a record number of victims," Edward Grilli, a spokesman for the district attorney's office said yesterday.

But Frank Daddato, one of Izzo's lawyers, said his client maintains his innocence. Daddato said he viewed the new indictments "as almost being a tactic of the district attorney's office. Trying to force somebody into taking a plea. I don't believe it's going to work with this guy. He's going to go all the way."

As to the size of the new indictment, he said, referring to defendants: "Their knees buckle when they see that. It has a psychological effect on people."

As Izzo, of Hicksville, entered a plea of not guilty at his arraignment yesterday, a chorus of hisses and roars rose from the parents who crowded the Mineo courtroom. After the proceeding, at which he was remanded without bail on the new charges, parents taunted him as he was led from court.

The latest round of charges involves alleged abuse of seven boys and nine girls, 5 and 6 years old, who were driven to kindergarten classes in the Hicksville School District between September, 1988 and May, 1989.

Nassau District Attorney Denis Dillon said that some of the assaults took place when Izzo parked the full-size bus in an unused parking lot of a local mall. "He would actually shield the window of the bus so nobody could see into the bus," he said.

A law enforcement source who asked not to be named said that Izzo sometimes used seat cushions to block the windows and that assaults also allegedly occurred when Izzo parked on residential

Parents Try to Recover

In the past three months, the parents of Hicksville children who allegedly were sexually abused by school bus driver Robert Izzo have worked to heal their own anger and pain while helping their children to recover.

And they have asked themselves why they couldn't tell their children were in trouble.

"If you take your worst nightmare and multiply it by infinity, that is what this is," said a 37-year-old Willet Avenue man whose son allegedly was sexually abused by Izzo. "Children are terrified because of threats, shame and guilt, and that is so terrible. If any parent out there said they didn't feel guilty they are

lying. We all feel guilt and denial . . . That's why we've banded together."

The parents talk among themselves. They attend free sessions with professional counselors from North Shore University's Family Crisis Center in Manhasset. Their children have seen the counselors once and can return for group therapy with their parents if they pay a fee. And the parents try to talk to their children about what happened to them.

When Izzo was arraigned yesterday, the court was filled with parents.

After they learned in July that Izzo had been indicted and accused of molesting a 5-year-old Willet

streets. At yesterday's arraignment, silence fell as a court clerk read the charges: "Rape, first degree — 15 counts; sodomy, first degree — 31 counts; sexual abuse, first degree — 58 counts; endangering the welfare of a child — 39 counts."

After the arraignment, scores of parents went to the west wing exit of the building to get a glimpse of Izzo leaving the courthouse.

"I'm waiting for him to come out," said one father who asked not to be named. "It's the idea of looking at him and seeing what a pedophile looks like up close."

The parents waited behind a row of reporters and photographers whose cameras were aimed through the holes of a chain link fence that protected the exit area. They began to call out when Izzo finally appeared, flanked by two detectives.

Izzo tried to look away from parents who began calling out to him.

"Feeling a little nervous, huh?" one woman yelled. Another shouted "bye bye" as a detective pushed Izzo's head into a waiting police car. The group broke out into applause as the car drove off. He is due back in court Nov. 3.

For two years Izzo was employed by the Harran Transportation Co. and drove school children to and from the Willet Avenue Elementary School, Fork Lane School, and Hicksville Middle School in the Hicksville School District; the St. Ignatius Parochial School, Holy Family School, and a YMCA camp.

Officials at Harran could not be reached yesterday. The company suspended Izzo without pay following his arrest in May. Company officials have said that Izzo was fingerprinted, checked to rule out drug abuse and a criminal background when he joined the company, and that nothing untoward was found.

And a neighbor of Izzo's in Hicksville who said she had known him most of his life described him yesterday as "a quiet boy."

"He never caused any problems. . . All I can say is that they are a lovely family," said Frances Knight.

Izzo, who grew up in Hicksville, had served in the Navy. Before being hired by Harran Transportation Co. in 1986, Izzo was lab manager for On Target Photography and an aerial photographer's assistant at Sky Views Surveying. He was an avid amateur photographer, according to neighbors and acquaintances.

Izzo was first arrested on May 21 and charged with sexually abusing a 12-year-old boy in 1986 when the child was 10 years old. He was released on \$20,000 bail in that case, but was rearrested two months later and held without bail in connection with the alleged first-degree sexual abuse of a 5-year-old girl, whose case was included in yesterday's indictment charges. . . , a grand jury handed up a 20-count indictment in connection with the 12-year-old boy. In Sep-

tember, he was indicted a second time on 15 more charges of alleged offenses that occurred during an overnight trip with another three boys aged 11 and 12 who were members of Izzo's Hicksville Boy Scout troop.

In addition to the criminal charges, a civil suit seeking damages of up to \$72 million is expected to be filed next week in State Supreme Court in Mincola against the school district and Harran Transportation.

Hicksville School Superintendent Catherine J. Fen-

ton attended yesterday's the court proceeding, but declined to comment yesterday. Nora Richards, a district spokeswoman, said that the board had recently placed surveillance cameras at the front entrance of schools and that the district is in the process of hiring monitors to ride the school buses with kindergarten pupils. The district is also holding drivers accountable for any delays in their bus routes.

one Elementary School girl, the parents began meeting together "to cry, to scream to share it all," one father said. By that time, police had begun interviewing their own children to see if they too had been molested.

The hardest part, the parents said, is the fear that their children may have been sexually abused for several months without telling anyone.

"I never noticed she was upset," said the mother of one girl. "I can't believe I didn't notice it."

In the courtroom, the parents of the alleged victims released a statement urging other parents to "turn off the 6 o'clock news and listen to what you kids have to say. And believe them."

And in front of the school, many of the parents spoke freely about the incident in the hope that other parents would listen more.

"There is a lot that kids don't tell you," said a 31-year-old mother as she waited to pick up her daughter outside the Willet Avenue Elementary School. "But when they do, listen."

"It could happen to anyone," added a 32-year-old mother who was in the courtroom for Izzo's arraignment. "We are the victims, but there are a lot more Bob Izzos out there."

The school district has scheduled meetings to help parents identify the warning signs of sexual abuse among children. About 10 parents, none of whom have children involved in the abuse cases, met last night at the Burns Elementary School in Hicksville with Dr. Sandra Kaplan, chief child and adolescent psychologist at North Shore-University Hospital. Kaplan said that sexually abused children may exhibit excessive crying, fear of going to school, not wanting to be alone with a babysitter, and fear of separation from parents.

Kaplan, speaking to the group in the school's cafeteria, said parents should keep communications open with their children. . . could talk about such problems; . . .

The parents say they have gotten some relief from sharing their frustrations and fears with one another and focusing their energies on changing Hicksville school policies.

The schools have taken some corrective measures. They have installed surveillance cameras at the front entrance of schools. They are considering tougher hiring practices for school bus drivers. And they have promised to hire monitors to ride the school bus drivers with kindergarten.

But some parents, angry at the school district for its handling of the incident, are upset that the monitors still aren't on the buses.

One mother said yesterday she refuses to let her kindergarten-aged son ride the school bus until a monitor is hired. "They promised, but I haven't seen anything yet," the mother said. "And I still come to pick up my son. You know, I don't trust anybody now."

Many of the parents said they did not learn of problems with Izzo — by all accounts, a friendly, outgoing bus driver and scoutmaster who was well loved by children — until the police came to their homes during the summer, after Izzo was arrested and accused of sexually abusing a 12-year-old boy in May.

"I found out from another mother," said the mother of three children who attend Willet Avenue Elementary School. "The school never told me and they should have. They were responsible. It happened on school time and school property."

Hicksville school officials did not return telephone calls yesterday. But school board member Patricia Rooney said she hopes the community will be able to pull together and learn from what she acknowledged is a very painful situation.

"This is a deep wound," Rooney said. "He [Izzo] is someone who lived here, not someone who [just] drove a bus. There are several layers to heal."

Hicksville Superintendent Catherine J. Fen-ton said in a prepared statement, "The district is in sympathy with parents. . . ."



Jury Adds 15 Charges in Sex Offense Case

By Shirley E. Perlman

A Nassau grand jury yesterday handed down 15 more charges of sodomy and sexual abuse against a former Hicksville school bus driver and scout leader, and District Attorney Denis Dillon said later that an additional 20 complaints against Robert Izzo remain under investigation.

"If these complaints are corroborated, we could have more complaints in this case than in the Friedman case," Dillon said, referring to the Great Neck father and son convicted after being charged together with hundreds of counts of sexual abuse involving more than a dozen boys.

The new charges against Izzo, who lives in Hicksville, were contained in a 15-count indictment on alleged offenses with three boys aged 11 and 12 who were members of Izzo's scout troop, bringing the number of alleged victims to five. A 20-count indictment against Izzo was handed up July 27.

The new indictment charges Izzo, 39, with sodomizing and sexually assaulting the three during overnight camp trips in Nassau County between September, 1987, and November, 1988.

Assistant District Attorney Maureen Riordan said the 20 cases still under investigation involve school bus riders and other members of the scout troop. She declined further comment on the investigation but praised parents for their cooperation.

As a result of pressure from parents, the Hicksville Board of Education is exploring the possibility of either breaking

its contract with the Harran Transportation Co., which employed Izzo as a driver until his May 21 arrest, or in improving employee controls, a district spokeswoman said.

Jeff Weintraub, a Harran official, called the board's considerations "ludicrous . . .

"In essence, you're jeopardizing the livelihood of 50 other employees, some of whom have been with this company for 39 years," Weintraub said.

Izzo, of 12 Loretta Lane, is being held on \$450,000 bail at the Nassau County jail.

Arraignment on the new charges is scheduled for Monday before County Court Judge Marvin Goodman in Mineola.

Izzo's lawyer, Anthony Capetola, declined to comment on the new charges. He said that he had not seen the indictment.

Angry Parents Jam Driver's Hearing

This story was reported by Monte R. Young and William Spindle and written by Dele Olojede.

About 35 angry parents gathered in First District Court in Hempstead yesterday, demanding that a kindergarten bus driver facing charges of sexually abusing children be jailed pending resolution of the case. Judge Ira Warshawski threatened several times to clear the courtroom, but when he finally ordered the defendant, Robert Izzo of Hicksville, held without bail in Nassau County Jail, many of the parents cheered.

"The people feel that the defendant is a threat to the community," said Assistant

District Attorney David Sullivan, who asked for a \$5-million bail. "While on bail for a similar charge, the defendant has gone around harassing students and their families."

Izzo was arraigned yesterday on charges of first-degree sexual abuse of a 5-year-old girl on his bus route for kindergartners at the Willets Avenue Elementary School in Hicksville. He was also charged with endangering the welfare of the child. The charges stemmed from a previous charge on May 21 that he sexually abused another schoolchild. Prosecutors said he is being investigated in connection with

20 other alleged incidents. Defense Attorney Frank Daddato asked the judge to set his client free, saying Izzo had posted a \$20,000 bail for the earlier charge.

Shouts of "no, no" rang out as Daddato made his plea. The judge ordered the crowd to be quiet or face being ejected.

Many of the parents, who did not identify themselves, said they feared that many more children had been involved. The prosecution, in court documents, alleged that Izzo set aside "kiss-the-driver day,"

"tickle day," "candy day" and "hug day," during which he allegedly abused the children.

Several parents said that Izzo had visited them after his May 21 arrest. They said yesterday that they were unaware of his arrest at the time, and that they now think he had been seeking their support.

Nassau police said the alleged incidents of sexual abuse took place between September, 1988 and May.

Izzo, 39, of Loretta Lane, was arrested Friday on the latest charge. He was employed by the Harran Bus Co. until suspended in May, when he was first arrested.

Daddato called the charges frivolous. "They are trying to stack the deck against him, hoping he will plea bargain, but he won't. He has told me he's innocent."

Daddato said Izzo worked for the bus company for 2½ years, and served in the U.S. Navy between 1970 and 1978.

Catherine J. Fenton, the Hicksville school superintendent, said Izzo had not transported children at the Willets Avenue school since the bus company informed the district of the May 21 sex charge against him involving a 10-year-old from another school district.

Fenton said all bus drivers working for the school district are fingerprinted and their records are

checked by the state. Izzo had no previous record, she said, which was confirmed by police.

Fenton said that because the child involved in the first abuse charge was not from their district, the school board decided not to inform parents.

Deputy Inspector Ronald Olsen of Nassau police said that in the two separate incidents allegedly involving Izzo, parents came forward with information. He said as far as he knew, the alleged incidents involved fondling and that none of the children were reported to have been raped.

Police are asking anyone with further information to contact the Sex Crimes Unit at 535-7816.

A hearing in the case was set for Aug. 25.

Bus Route Had Been Changed

A kindergarten bus driver charged with sexually abusing two children was transferred to a new route two years ago after he asked students at a Hicksville school for photographs of themselves, the school's principal said yesterday.

Harran Transportation Co. agreed to transfer driver Robert Izzo of Hicksville after it received a complaint about his behavior toward students he was driving to St. Ignatius Parochial School, St. Ignatius Principal Jacqueline Burdi said.

But Harran Transportation never considered disciplining Izzo or taking him off school routes altogether because there were "no accusations of misconduct" in the St. Ignatius complaint, said Jeff Weintraub, a company vice president.

It is fairly normal to get requests to have a driver's

route changed. You might get a parent or two who doesn't like the driver for some reason," Weintraub said. "Since there were no charges of crimes or misconduct, we just transferred Mr. Izzo to a different route."

Izzo asked the students for "regular photographs," not shots that might be considered sexual or physically revealing, Burdi said.

Izzo, 39, of Loretta Lane, was charged Saturday with first-degree sexual abuse of a 5-year-old girl on his bus

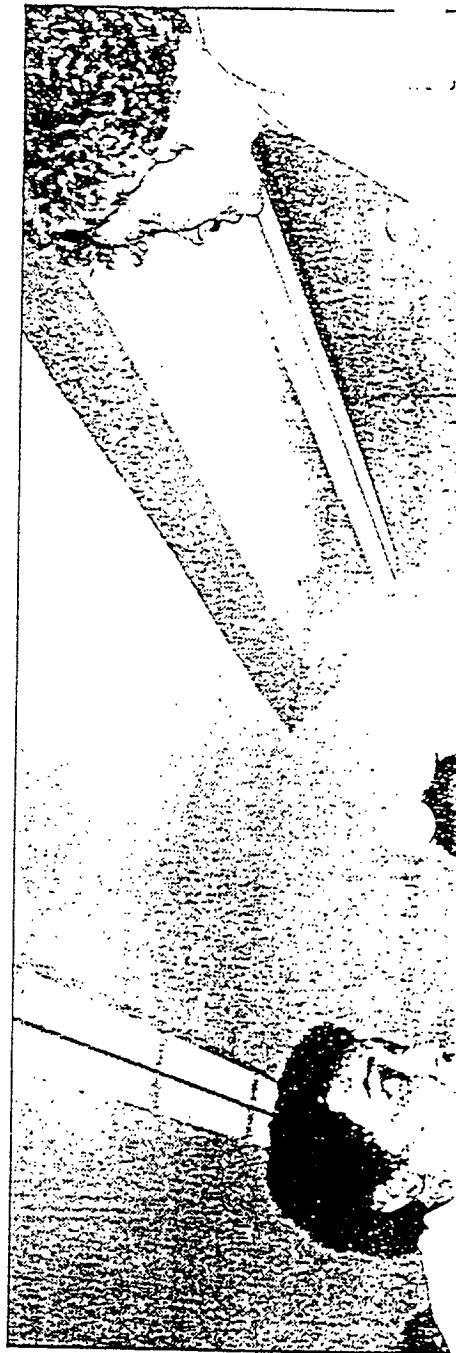
route for kindergarten students at Willels Avenue Elementary School in Hicksville. He is being held without bail in Nassau County jail. His attorney, Frank Dodato, said Saturday that Izzo told him he is innocent. Izzo was arrested May 21 on a charge of sexual abuse of a 10- or 11-year-old boy, who apparently was not on his bus route. Izzo was freed on \$20,000 bail for that charge. Nassau police said the alleged incidents occurred between September, 1988, and May.

Prosecutors are now investigating Izzo in connection with as many as 20 other alleged incidents, as well as his possible involvement in youth-oriented groups. Neighbors and acquaintances said yesterday that Izzo was a leader or volunteer with a Cub Scouts or Boy Scouts troop in the Hicksville area. Officials

of those organizations could not be reached yesterday.

Burdi said she did not remember how many students had said Izzo asked them for photographs or whether the school had mentioned the photo issue in its complaint to Harran Transportation.

"We thought there was something strange about it, so we asked the bus company to stop using him to transport our students," Burdi said. "We did it purely as a precautionary measure and we do not believe there were any incidents of any kind involving Mr. Izzo and our students."

Harran Transportation buses students to St. Ignatius and other private schools as part of its contract with the school district, Weintraub said.

Izzo was fingerprinted, tested for drug use and checked for criminal background when he first started working for Harran Transportation about three years ago, and "he came back clean on everything," Weintraub said. The company placed him on indefinite leave without pay after the

first child-abuse charge.

Neighbors and acquaintances described Izzo as a good neighbor and family man who had a keen interest in photography. They said he had lived for several years with his parents, wife and two young sons on Loretta Lane, a quiet street of carefully manicured lawns and middle-income homes. No one was home at Izzo's house yesterday.

"The parents and kids just loved him as a bus driver," said one neighbor, who asked not to be identified. "He seems like such a nice man."

"We held block parties and he was always assisting in setting up. I can't believe this," said Frances Knights, another neighbor.

Izzo was well liked by most teachers and parents and was considered a "preferred bus driver . . . because he was so cooperative," said Hicksville School Superintendent Catherine J. Fenton.

Investigators and neighbors said yesterday they did not know what he had done before the bus-driving job.

Durnan, the coordinator of English as a Second Language courses for the Adelphi program.

The program was brought to Huntington as a result of the efforts of a group of volunteers for the town youth bureau who had organized English courses for immigrants at St. Hugh's more than a year ago.

"I know how many states there are in the United States and I know how many presidents there have been," said Carlos Usma, an immigrant from Medellin, Colombia, who attends the course in Huntington Station after a Sunday mass in Spanish at St. Hugh's Catholic Church. "I know many people who speak English now."



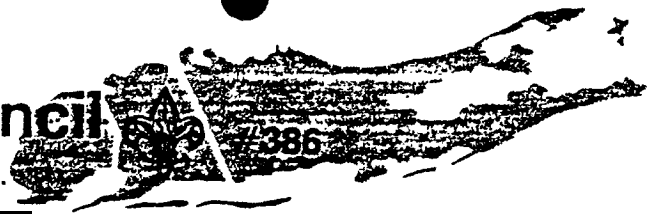

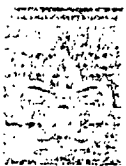
